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
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From the Desk of DIRECTOR GENERAL

DRUG

TRAFFICKING SCENARIO IN INDIA

The problem of drug trafficking in India is the consequence of several external and internal factors. One of the prime geographical factors influencing India's drug situation is its close proximity to the Opium producing countries like Afghanistan, Pakistan & Iran in the West as well as Myanmar, Laos and Thailand in the East which in turn is escalated by the presence of a long maritime border. This has rendered India both a destination and a transit route for opiates as well as synthetic drugs to some extent. Besides, India has one of the biggest pharmaceutical industrial bases & diversion of pharmaceutical substances is resulting in the increasing abuse of prescription drugs. Moreover, illicit cultivation of Opium Poppy and Cannabis is also an issue of concern in our country. The drug situation in India is, therefore, a complex combination of several factors.

The salient features of drug trafficking scenario in India may be summarized as under:-

- Trafficking of opiates from South West Asia and South East Asia to India.
- ii. Illicit cultivation of opium & wild growth of cannabis in some pockets.
- iii. Increase in instances of trafficking through dark net involving crypto currencies viz. bit coins.
- iv. Involvement of foreign nationals in trafficking and distribution

- networks of Heroin and Cocaine.
- v. Diversion of pharmaceutical drugs and influx of ATS from Myanmar in North Eastern States of India.
- vi. Increase in trafficking through courier parcels due to disruption of international air traffic post COVID-19.
- vii. Maritime trafficking of Heroin, ATS and other drugs from crescent countries to India and further to Sri Lanka and other countries.
- viii. Increase in trafficking of Ganja within India due to decreased supply of other synthetic drugs post COVID-19 and countrywide lockdown.
- ix. Day-to-day evolution of NPS (New Psychoactive Substances)

1.1 TRENDS AND PATTERNS 2021

With the ever changing drug scenario and changed dynamics post COVID-19 outbreak, drug law enforcement agencies across the globe and DLEAs in India in particular are facing some significant challenges in the drug trafficking. Some most significant trends noticed by DLEAs in India are as under:

- i. Drugs Trafficking through courier/parcels/Post -
- The restrictions imposed on vehicular/ship/airplane movement during COVID-19 pandemic has made drug traffickers to rely more

- upon courier/parcel/post. This field has emerged as more challenging for DLEAs.
- Parcel seizures in 2020 marked an increase of 300 % over 2019. This increase mainly owe to the global disruption of air-traffic due to COVID-19. No. of parcel cases in
- 2021, is also almost double that of no of cases is 2019.
- High increase in no of parcel cases is also due to the increased trafficking of drugs through darknet markets.

ii. Drugs Trafficking through Dark net (cases cracked by NCB during 2021):

With the advancement in technology, the drug traffickers have adopted modern means like internet for drug trafficking. It has been observed that a new mode of drug trafficking is happening through dark-net using cryptocurrency. The finalization of drug

deals and transactions through dark-net and digital currencies have transcended the geographical boundaries. The easy accessibility of internet in India and presence of a large young population further complicates this problem. Some of the prominent cases cracked by NCB during the year 2021 are as under:-

iii. Increase in maritime trafficking of drugs:

The maritime drug trafficking in Arabian Sea and Bay of Bengal poses new challenges to drug law enforcement agencies and they anticipate further increase of this route by international drug trafficking syndicates operating from Pakistan and Afghanistan. It is estimated that more than 70% of total drug trafficking is being conducted through maritime route. Interception of maritime drug trafficking, especially in

the Western region of India has witnessed an increase. Most of such seizures are sourced from the ports of Afghanistan / Iran which are destined to coastal states in India or are in further transit to countries like Sri Lanka, Maldives etc. While Heroin is the most rrafficked drug through maritime route, ATS, Charas, Cocaine etc. are also seized.

1.2 NARCOTIC DRUGS 1.2.1 OPIUM




There are a number of alkaloids that can be extracted from opium, some major alkaloids are morphine, codeine, thebaine, papavering and noscapine which are being extracted at Government Opium & Alkaloid Works at Neemuch (MP) and Ghazipur (UP).

Trends:

- Trafficking from Rajasthan, U.P. and M.P. to other parts of country.
- Major trafficking of Opium is from the states of Manipur, West Bengal, Jammu & Kashmir, Uttarakhand, Bihar, Jharkhand and Gujarat.

Total Opium seizures effected in 2021 were 4530 Kg. The comparative figures for the last 05 years are given below. While there has been a variation of trend in the number of

reported Opium seizures in comparison to previous years, up to 2019, the quantity of Opium seized has decreased from 5204 Kg in 2020 to 4530 Kg in 2021.



Significant seizures of Opium by NCB:

CASE STUDY-BIGGEST OPIUM SEIZURES

1. Seizure of 132.550 KG Opium by NCB Imphal Sub-Zone

On 13.08.2021, acting on specific information, a team of NCB Sub-Zone Imphal, with support of 182 Bn BSF and FGT BSF Imphal intercepted a consignment of huge quantity of Opium which was to be delivered by a lady and her associate to a receiver at village Changoubung about 2 kms ahead of Kangpokpi town towards Senapati along Imphal – Dimapur Road. The team recovered 60 packets (60.350 Kg) of Opium from a Tata Truck driven by the receiver and seized a white colour Bolero (without registration number) owned by the lady. On the same day the lady, her associate and the driver of the truck (receiver) were arrested.

On preliminary investigation the lady revealed that she had procured the contraband from a person, R/o Kangpokpi, ward No 17 and further stated that another huge quantity of Opium was concealed in his house and she could lead the team to affect the seizure. On the basis of the lead provided by the lady, the team conducted search at the supplier's house as a follow up action and recovered another 71 (72.200 kgs) packets of suspected opium. Total weight of the seized items was about 132.550 kgs.

Further to this, on preliminary questioning, the supplier revealed that he had procured the seized items from his uncle, R/o Porompat near JNIMS hospital, District-Imphal, East Manipur. The team conducted search operation at the residence of the supplier's uncle on the same day. The sale proceeds of the drugs amounting to Rs 57.82 lakhs and yellow color metal (suspected to be gold) weighing 117 grams were recovered. However, no contraband items were recovered.



2. Seizure of 41.206 KG Opium by NCB Jodhpur Zone

On 02.07.2021, acting on a specific intelligence regarding trafficking of huge quantity of Opium from Manipur to Western Rajasthan, NCB Jodhpur Zonal Unit intercepted a Tata truck near Railway Fatak, Jalore-Bhinmal Road (State Highway), Bhinmal, Jalore (Rajasthan) and recovered 41.206 kg Opium. In this connection, on 03/07/2021 two person resident of Jalore and Barmer (Rajasthan) respectively were arrested and produced before the Hon'ble ACJM, Jalore and further sent to judicial custody. As per the preliminary investigation, the seized Opium was sourced from Manipur and was destined to Western Rajasthan.

1.2.2 HEROIN

Heroin is a highly addictive drug which is synthesized from opium. Raw opium is dried and purified to produce morphine which is then treated with Acetic Anhydride to make heroin. Depending upon its processing, heroin comes out in a variety of colours, ranging from white to dark brown. Heroin is also known as smack, brown sugar locally and chitta in Punjab. The level of purity of heroin is indicative of the degree of sophistication in its processing.






Trends:-

- Major trafficking of Heroin in India takes place through India-Pakistan border,i.e., through bordering states of Punjab and Jammu & Kashmir. From these bordering states Heroin is trafficked into other states.
- Recent trend of increase in Maritime trafficking of South West Asian Heroin through sea.
- Inter-State trafficking of Opium poppy from the states of West Bengal. Uttarakhand, Bihar, Jharkhand, Jammu & Kashmir, and Manipur
- Substantial quantity seizures of Heroin have been effected in Punjab, Delhi, and UP.

Trafficking of Heroin from African countries to India

- During past two years post COVID, trafficking of Heroin from African countries to India has increased. This trafficking is being carried out by human carriers in personal belongings as well as in the courier parcels. The major source countries for such trafficking are – South Africa, Uganda, Kenya etc.
- During 2020 2021, 52 such instances through human carriers and 11 Instances of trafficking through courier parcels sourced from African countries have been reported to NCB.

CASE STUDY - BIGGEST HEROIN SEIZURES

1. Seizure of 300.323 Kg of Heroin, 05 nos. of AK-47 Rifles and 1000 nos. of 9 mm ammunition – NCB Cochin Sub-Zone (Chennai Zone)

On 25.03.2021, NCB, Sub-Zone Cochin seized 300.323 Kgs of Heroin, 05 nos of AK-47 rifles and 1000 nos. of 9mm ammunition from one Sri Lankan fishing boat at Vizhinjam Port and arrested six Sri Lankan nationals. The case was handed over by the Indian Coast Guard. A case was registered under NDPS Act by NCB Sub Zone, Cochin.

Investigations revealed that on the instruction of one Srilankan (the owner of the seized boat), six of the arrested Srilankan

nationals started from Sri Lanka on 07.03.2021 in the Sri Lankan fishing boat and received the above mentioned contraband mid-sea from a white colour boat on

14.03.2021. While returning, they were apprehended by the Indian Coast Guard along with the contraband and the fishing boat.



2. Seizure of 337 Kg of Heroin – NCB Cochin Sub-Zone (Chennai Zone)

Indian Naval Ship intercepted a Srilankan fishing boat maneuvering in stateless position. The boat was registered at Nigambo/Dikovita/Trinco with a crew of 05 Srilankan person. A thorough search by Naval personnel resulted in the recovery of 340 packets of Heroin. On 19.04.2021, NCB teams of Cochin and Chennai had taken over the fishing boat, 340 packets of contraband at Mattancherry Wharf, Cochin alongwith five apprehended Srilankan person.

A thorough search of the Sri Lankan fishing boat was carried out by NCB team

with help of naval officials and seizure formalities were completed on 20,04,2021 with arrest of five Srilankan crew, Total 337 Kgs of Heroin, a Satellite mobile phone and other communication devices were seized. Each of the 340 packets bore the marking of Crown Symbol with words "KING 2021". A case was registered with NCB Cochin Sub Zonal Unit. All five crew members confessed having the knowledge and part of the conspiracy of bringing the contraband from high seas from an Iranian boat and to deliver the same to drug traffickers based at Srilanka. On the basis of their voluntary confessional statements they were arrested by Narcotics Control Bureau.



3. Seizure of 08 Kg of Heroin - NCB Delhi Zone

On 28.01.2021, acting on specific information that, two ladies of Ugandan nationality carrying Narcotics Drugs in their Baggage will arrive at Terminal-3, IGI Airport, New Delhi by Air Arabia Flight, a team of NCB Delhi Zonal Unit intercepted both the ladies near belt no-14 of the arrival hall. During the search of the baggage, NCB team recovered 04 kg Heroine and 560 gm of Cocaine from baggage of one lady and 04 kg Heroin and 510 gm of Cocaine from baggage of another lady. All the contraband items recovered were seized after observing legal formalities.

During preliminary investigation of the case, first lady revealed that she was going to deliver both the baggage to one person in Vikas Puri, Near Pastry Palace, Outer Ring Road, New Delhi and also disclosed one Indian mobile number. Accordingly a team of NCB Delhi Zonal Unit reached at Vikas Puri, New Delhi along with both the Ugandan ladies. At the said place one Nigerian national was apprehended who came to receive the ladies. All these 03 persons were arrested by NCB.


1.2.3 CANNABIS (GANJA)



According to the UNODC, "Cannabis is the most widely used illicit substance in the world". The typical herbal form of cannabis consists of the flowers and substending leaves and stalks of mature pistillate of female plants. The resinous form of the drug is known as Hashish. Cannabis contains a number of chemical substances, however the most predominant and only psychoactive substance is (-)-trans-delta9-tetrahydro cannabinol (delta-9-THC or THC).

Trends:

- Trafficking from the North-East India to eastern states is mainly by surface transport.
- Trafficking in substantial quantities takes place across India - Nepal border and in the states of Odisha, Himachal Pradesh and in small
- quantities from states of Manipur and West Bengal.
- The main transit routes for Ganja are through Assam, Odisha, West Bengal, Bihar, Uttar Pradesh, Nagaland, Maharashtra and Chhattisgarh.

CASE STUDY-BIGGEST GANJA SEIZURES

1. Case Study: Seizure of 1376.070 Kg Ganja by Indore Zone.

On 15.08.2021, NCB, Zonal Unit, Indore (MP) seized 1376.070 Kg Ganja and arrested 03 persons at Tarana road, near R. R. Cold Storage, Gujjar Kheda, Tarana, Dist-Ujjain (MP). The Ganja was packed in 44 plastic bags hidden inside the main body of truck underneath plastic bags (400 nos.) of paddy husk. Suspected source and destination of the seized drug were Andhra Pradesh and Tarana, Ujjain (MP) respectively. The supplier of this case was also found to be involved in two other cases. Follow up actions were carried out resulting into the apprehension of the accused from the Dharangaon, Dist Jalgaon (Maharashtra) on 18.01.2022.



2. Seizure of 1586.030 Kg of Ganja by NCB Guwahati Zone

On 28.03.2021, NCB Guwahati Zonal Unit seized 1586.030 Kg Ganja from a container truck at NH-15, Baihata Chariali, Kamrup (R), Assam. The main supplier R/o Longkhrang, Karbi Anglong, Assam and his associate R/o Motihari, Bihar had loaded 152 rectangular shaped black coloured packets of Ganja in compressed form in a specially made cavity which ran across the driver cabin of the seized truck. The door of this cavity was behind the co-driver seat.

During preliminary investigation of the case, the accused person both R/o Daugavan, Bulandshahr, Uttar Pradesh revealed that after taking this consignment of Ganja, they had departed for Bihar to deliver the consignment to the receivers R/o Narayanpur, Arah Bhojpur, Bihar and Mathurapur, East Champaran, Bihar. Both driver and co-driver alongwith the truck were apprehended enroute and arrested on 28.03.2021. During follow-up action, following arrests were made:

- On dated 29.03.2021 and 30.03.2021 associate of the main supplier and one of the receiver were arrested.
- On dated 23.10.2021 another receiver was arrested.
- On dated 15.11.2021 the main supplier was also arrested.

3. Seizure of 3372 Kg Ganja by Hyderabad Sub-Zone (Bangalore Zone)

On 28.08.2021, a team of NCB Hyderabad Sub-Zone intercepted one TATA Truck near Pedda Amberpet Toll Plaza, On Outer Ring Road, Vill: Pedda Amberpet, Hayath Nagar Mandal,

Rangareddy District – 501 505, Telangana and seized 3372 Kgs of Ganja from the vehicle. There were 1686 packets of Ganja, approx 02 Kg each in compressed form kept in polythene covers tightly compressed and wrapped with brown colour adhesive tapes.

Source and destination of Ganja were Sileru at Vizag District and Osmanabad respectively. The region of Vishakhaptanam and Andhra & Odisha border is prone to illegal cultivation of Ganja in a rampant way. The recovered Ganja and the vehicle used for transportation had been seized. Three person were arrested on 29.08.2021. Further during investigation, it was revealed that a number of traffickers are operating at Osmanabad. Two of them were identified and later arrested by State police during transportation of Ganja.





4. Seizure of 2198 Kg of Ganja by NCB Hyderabad Sub-Zone (Bangalore Zone)

On 20/21.06.2021, based on specific information, 2198 Kgs Ganja which was concealed under Raw Cashew Shells in a Tata Truck had been seized by NCB, Hyderabad Sub-Zone. During the preliminary investigation, it was revealed that the Ganja is being trafficked from Sileru to Pune and Osmanabad. Three

adults and one CCL (Children in Conflict with Law) travelling in the said Tata Truck were apprehended and further remanded to judicial custody/Government observation home for boys.

During the investigation, it is revealed that the accused were from an organized gang of Ganja trafficking and earlier they had also collected Ganja from same supplier. The facts are

corroborated with their locations and incorporated in Complaint filed in the Court. It is also revealed that the same supplier was involved in trafficking of 3372 Kg Ganja which was also seized by NCB, Hyderabad on 28/29.08.2021. Officers of NCB, Hyderabad Sub-Zone obtained the photo of the Supplier which was also identified by the traffickers of Ganja. Further investigation regarding apprehension of supplier is in progress.



1.2.4 CANNABIS (HASHISH)

Hashish or Charas is the cannabis resin derived from the plant cannabis sativa. Generally hashish is obtained from the plant by rubbing the flowering tops of the cannabis plant between the palms of the hands or on rubber sheets. Cannabis resin is placed under Schedule I and IV of the Single Convention on Narcotic Drugs of 1961.


Trends:

- Charas/Hashish is derived from the illicit cannabis cultivation being done by the drug traffickers at Kashmir Valley especially in the districts of South Kashmir and Kullu in Himachal Pradesh.
- There is a trend of trafficking of Charas from Kashmir and Himachal



Pradesh to Maharashtra, Rajasthan, Goa & Gujarat and other metro towns of India.

• Charas is also trafficked from Nepal to India.

- On 05.09.2021, NCB, Chandigarh Zonal Unit seized 8.950 kg of Hashish at Rupnagar, Punjab. 02 persons were arrested.
- On 10.09.2021, NCB, Cochin Sub-Zone seized 3.500 kg of Hashish oil at A W Courier and Cargo,

- Ernakulam, Kerala.
- On 25.09.2021, NCB, Ahmedabad Zonal Unit seized 9.330 kg of Hashish at Mehsana, Gujarat. 03 persons were arrested.
- On 25.09.2021, NCB, Patna Zonal Unit seized 5 kg of Hashish at Patna, Bihar. 01 person was arrested.
- On 28.09.2021, NCB, Delhi Zonal Unit seized 10 kg of Hashish at Toll Plaza, Panipat, Haryana. 03 persons were arrested.
- On 16.11.2021, NCB, Ahmedabad Zonal Unit seized 5.234 kg of Hashish at Adalaj Toll Plaza, Gandhinagar, Gujarat. 02 persons were arrested.
- On 17.11.2021, NCB, Chandigarh Zonal Unit seized 3.540 kg of Hashish at Kaithal, Haryana. 02 persons were arrested.
- On 08.12.2021, NCB, Ahmedabad Zonal Unit seized 8.016 kg of Hashish at Adalaj Toll Plaza, Gandhinagar. 01 person was arrested.
- On 11.12.2021, NCB, Jammu Zonal Unit seized 5.600 kg of Hashish at Samba, J&K. 01 person was arrested.
- On 17.12.2021, NCB, Jammu Zonal Unit seized 6.500 kg of Hashish at Nagrota, Jammu. 02 persons were arrested.

CASE STUDY-BIGGEST HASHISH SEIZURE

1. Seizure of 26.090 Kg of Charas by NCB Madurai Sub-Zone (Chennai Zone)

Based on specific information, the officers of NCB, Madurai Sub-Zone

conducted search at the residential premises of a person R/o Thomas Nagar, Tuticorin. The search resulted in the recovery and seizure of 9.140 Kg of dark brown colour solid oily substance believed to be Hashish. The accused person was arrested on 06.02,2021. On the revelations made by the accused, another residential premise at Keela Shanmugapuram, Tuticorin was also searched, resulting into recovery & seizure of additional quantity of 16.950 kg of Hashish and arrest of the second accused person on 07.02.2021. during further follow-up action, one Srilankan national, based in Chennai believed to be the mastermind of this conspiracy was apprehended on 25.07.2021.



2. Seizure of 24.500 Kg of Charas by NCB Amritsar Sub-Zone (Chandigarh Zone)

On 22.08.2021, on the basis of specific information a team of NCB Amritsar Sub-Zone laid a naka at Ladpalwan Toll Plaza on Amritsar – Pathankot road and intercepted a blue colour Canter coming from Chamba (HP). During search of the vehicle, 24.500 Kg Charas was seized from the possession of 02 accused person.

During preliminary investigation, it was revealed that the seized Charas was to be delivered to a person in Amritsar by the accused. Receiver was also apprehended in follow-up action of NCB team along with seizure of a Honda Activa and Rs 61,000/- at Kathunangal Toll Plaza. During the disclosure, it came out that a person from Maindroh, Chamba (HP) had send this Charas for the Amritsar based receiver whose cousin brother R/o Amritsar was also a part of the syndicate.

3. Seizure of 23.762 Kg of Charas by NCB Ahmedabad Zone

20.01.2021, on specific information, a team of NCB, Ahmedabad Zone had searched a truck at Vastral, Ahmedabad, in which three persons were travelling to Mumbai from Jammu & Kashmir. Thereafter, NCB Ahmedabad team seized 23.762 kg of Charas (gross weight) on 20-21.01.2021. In follow up action two person were also arrested alognwith the cash of Rs 2,98,200/-, who came to receive the said Charas on 20.01.2021. In this case, total five persons had been arrested on 21.01.2021. During the follow up action, one more person was arrested who was supposed to receive the said Charas.

1.2.5 COCAINE




Cocaine is widely used as a recreational drug that is prepared from coca leaves. It is found in South American countries, primarily Brazil, Colombia, Bolivia and Peru. Cocaine, originating in South America, is trafficked throughout the world. In India, it is mainly smuggled in small quantities by West African drug traffickers. It is generally encountered in two forms which differ in their route of administration. Cocaine hydrochloride, which is insufflated or injected, and cocaine base, which is a smokable form.

Trends:

Smuggling of cocaine is mostly being

- done by African nationals based in India.
- Instances of Cocaine being smuggled from Afghanistan, Argentina, Brazil and South America have also come to notice.
- Seizures of Cocaine in India have been made at airports mostly.
- There are many instances of small quantities of Cocaine trafficking through parcels concealed in common household articles like cosmetics, utensils, books and clothing.
- The latest trend is trafficking of Cocaine in liquid form.



Significant seizures of Cocaine by NCB:

- On 28.01.2021, NCB, Delhi Zonal Unit seized 8.000 kg of Heroin and 1.070 kg of Cocaine at IGI Airport, New Delhi. 03 persons were arrested.
- On 18.06.2021, NCB, Delhi Zonal Unit seized 135 grams of Cocaine at Mehrauli, New Delhi. 01 person was arrested.
- On 18.06.2021, NCB, Delhi Zonal Unit seized 115 grams of Cocaine at Vasant Kunj, New Delhi. 01 person was arrested.
- On 25.06.2021, NCB, Delhi Zonal

- Unit seized 122 grams of Cocaine at New Delhi. 01 person was arrested.
- On 05.08.2021, NCB, Mumbai Zonal Unit seized 102 gram of Cocaine at Mumbai, Maharashtra. 01 person was arrested.
- On 08.08.2021, NCB, Mumbai Zonal Unit seized 1.029 kg of Cocaine at Mumbai, Maharashtra. 01 person was arrested.
- On 11.08.2021, NCB, Ahmedabad Zonal Unit seized 4.275 kg of Cocaine at SVBP Airport, Ahmedabad, Gujarat. 01 person was arrested.

CASE STUDY-BIGGEST COCAINE SEIZURES

1. Seizure of 4.275 Kg Cocaine by NCB Ahmedabad Zone

On 11.08.2021, a team of NCB Ahmedabad Zone searched the checked-in baggage of a person detained against whom a look out circular was issued to

detain and inform to the originator. On search of purple coloured trolley bag of the detainee, 4.275 Kgs of Cocaine was seized from his possession. The person was subsequently arrested after recording of his statement. The arrested person was having South African Passport. Further, in follow up action one Ghana National was also arrested.



1.3 NARCOTIC CROPS

1.3.1 Licit Opium Poppy Cultivation

India is the only country, authorized by the United Nations Single Convention on Narcotic Drugs (1961), to produce gum opium. Countries such as Australia, Austria, France, China, Hungary, Netherlands, Poland, Slovenia, Spain, Trukey and Czech Republic also produce opium but through Concentrate of Poppy Straw (CPS) method.


Licit cultivation of Opium Poppy is carried out in India in selected tracts notified by the Central Government annually in the States of Madhya Preadesh, Rajasthan and Uttar Pradesh. Licences are issued by the CBN to eligible cultivators in the above three States as per the General Conditions relating to Grant of Licence framed by the Central

Government.


1.3.2 Illicit Opium Poppy Cultivation

The extent of illicit cultivation of opium poppy cannot be exactly quantified but eradications undertaken by law enforcement agencies are indicative of the areas prone to such cultivation. The Government of India has undertaken the satellite imaging of such illicit cultivation and results from this enable a more focused approach for eradication of the illicit crop.

During 2021, illicit cultivation of opium poppy was found in the states of Arunachal Pradesh, Assam, Manipur, Jharkhand, Madhya Pradesh, Jammu & Kashmir and Himachal Pradesh.




1.3.3 Illicit Cannabis Cultivation

Under the NDPS Act as well as under the UN Drug Control Conventions, the cultivation of Cannabis is illegal. One of the important countermeasures undertaken by NCB is to identify and destroy illicit cultivation of the plant.

During 2021, the area under illicit cannabis cultivation detected was around 27510 acres, in the states of Gujarat, Maharashtra, Odisha, Himachal Pradesh, Jammu & Kashmir, Tripura and Telangana which was subsequently destroyed by various Central & State agencies.

NCB Chandigarh Zonal Unit launched destruction campaign of illicit cannabis Himachal Pradesh in which Approx. 95 acres of illicit grown cannabis has been destroyed in the year 2021.

1.4 PSYCHOTROPIC SUBSTANCES

Psychotropic Substances are any chemical agent affecting the mind or mental processes (i.e. any psychoactive drug). The UN Convention on Psychotropic Substances, 1971, establishes the international control regime for such substances. The Convention responded to the diversification and expansion of the spectrum of drugs of abuse and introduced controls over a number of synthetic drugs according to their abuse potential on the one hand and their therapeutic value on the other.

The Government of India, on 23rd March 2021 has notified 06 substances as 'Manufactured Drugs' and 15 substances as 'Psychotropic Substance' respectively under the NDPS Act, 1985. The details of which are as under:

1.4.1 Synthetic Drugs



Synthetic drugs like Amphetamine Type

Stimulants (ATS) have become the drug of choice in South East Asia and in North America. In India, several attempts have been made in the past to set up clandestine manufacturing facilities, especially in Maharashtra and Gujarat to produce ATS. Narcotics Control Bureau has successfully thwarted these attempts.

Trends:

- Trafficking of ATS from Myanmar to India along North-Eastern Border States.
- Australia, Malaysia and Thailand are the major destination countries for ATS trafficking sourced from India.
- USA, Australia, Malaysia and South Africa are the major destination countries for Methaqualone/ Mandrax sourced from India.
- A major portion of Methaqualone/ Mandrax seizures are effected at Airports of New Delhi, Kolkata and Mumbai.

Significant seizures of Mephedrone by NCB:

- On 02.01.2021, NCB, Mumbai Zonal Unit seized 401.800 gram of Mephedrone at Mumbai. 01 person was arrested.
- On 15.01.2021, NCB, Mumbai Zonal Unit seized 386 gram of Mephedrone .01 person was arrested. In follow up action 88 gram more Mephedrone was seized on 16.01.2021.
- On 25.03.2021, NCB, Mumbai Zonal Unit seized 2.029 kg of Mephedrone at Andheri, Mumbai. 02 persons were arrested.

- On 03.08.2021, NCB, Ahmedabad Zonal Unit seized 4.550 kg of Mephedrone & Rs. 86,00,000 /- at Valsad, Gujarat. 02 persons were arrested.
- On 14.09.2021, NCB, Mumbai Zonal Unit seized 2.050 kg of Mephedrone at Mumbai. 04 persons were arrested.
- On 15.10.2021, NCB, Mumbai Zonal Unit seized 505 gram of Mephedrone at Mumbai. 01 person was arrested.

CASE STUDY-BIGGEST MEPHEDRONE SEIZURE

Seizure of 4.550 Kg. of Mephedrone by NCB Ahmedabad Zone

Acting on specific information, a team of NCB Ahmedabad Zone had seized 4.550 Kgs of Mephedrone, a Psychotropic Substances from the possession of two person and arrested them on 03.05.2021.

Further to this, a manufacturing unit at Dungri, Valsad was also searched resulting into seizure of large quantity of chemicals which were being used for manufacturing of Mephedrone along with unaccounted cash amounting Rs. 1,25,42,300/- (One crore twenty five lakh forty two thousand three hundred) acquired through illegal trafficking of Mephedrone. Total 04 nos. of accused persons were arrested in this connection.



Significant seizures of Amphetamine Type Stimulants (ATS) by NCB:

- On 18.05.2021, NCB, Kolkata Zonal Unit seized 618 gram of Methamphetamine at Murshidabad, West Bengal. 02 persons were arrested.
- On 27.05.2021, NCB, Mumai Zonal Unit seized 420 gram of Methamphetamine at DHL Couriers, Andheri West, Mumbai.
- On 18.07.2021, NCB, Madurai Sub-Zone seized 2.235 kg of Amphetamine at Coimbatore, Tamilnadu. 01 person was arrested.
- On 24.08.2021, NCB, Chennai Zonal Unit seized 7.900 kg of Amphetamine at Chennai, Tamilnadu. 03 persons were arrested.
- On 26.08.2021, NCB, Bangalore Zonal Unit seized 1 kg of MDMA at Electronic City Post Office, Bangalore. 01 person was arrested.
- On 18.10.2021, NCB, Delhi Zonal Unit seized 800 gram of Amphetamine at DHL Express Pvt. Ltd., Kirt Nagar, New Delhi. In follow up action 800 gram of Methamphetamine was seized and two persons were arrested at Uttam Nagar, New Delhi.
- On 12.11.2021, NCB, Delhi Zonal Unit seized 1.040 kg of Amphetamine at DHL Express Pvt. Ltd., Rama Road, Kirti

- Nagar, New Delhi. In follow up action 1.015 kg of Amphetamine was seized and 01 person was arrested.
- On 08.12.2021, NCB, Imphal Sub-Zone seized 10.397 kg of Amphetamine at Imphal Airport, Manipur. 02 persons were arrested.

CASE STUDY-BIGGEST AMPHETAMINE SEIZURE

1. Seizure of 10.397 kg of Crystal Amphetamine by NCB Imphal Sub-Zone (Guwahati Zone)

Based on specific information received on 08.12.2021, a team of NCB Imphal Sub-Zone intercepted two suspects and recovered 10.397 kg of crystal Amphetamine from their trolley bag at Imphal International Airport.

The accused person were arrested and produced before the Ld. Magistrate, Imphal on 09.12.2021 and remanded to judicial custody.



2. Seizure of 07.900 Kg of Methamphetamine by NCB Chennai Zone

On 24.08.2021, based on the specific information developed by NCB, Chennai Zonal Unit, the officers of NCB Chennai intercepted a truck bearing Tamil Nadu registration at Karanodai Toll Plaza. Search operation of the truck resulted in

the recovery of 7.900 kgs of Methamphetamine, concealed in small packets with contents written in Chinese language on the same. Three person, all residents of Red Hills, Chennai were apprehended and subsquently arrested in this case. The seized Methamphetamine was sourced from Moreh, Manipur and was destined to Chennai.



1.5 Precursor Chemicals

Precursor Chemicals are dual use chemicals that have legitimate uses, and can also be used in the manufacture of illicit narcotic drugs and psychotropic substances.

Trends

- Ephedrine/ Pseudoephedrine trafficking is done mainly through Delhi, Chennai, Cochin and Airports.
- There are instances of use of courier/ parcels also.

Significant seizures of Ephedrine/ Pseudoephedrine:

- On 15.01.2021, NCB, Hyderabad Sub-Zone seized 45 kg of Ephedrine at Chennai, Tamilnadu. 02 persons were arrested.
- On 05.03.2021, NCB, Delhi Zonal Unit seized 7.020 kg of Pseudoephedrine near Ambedkar Stadium, Delhi. 03 persons were arrested.
- On 23.04.2021, NCB, Hyderabad Sub-Zone seized 5 kg of Pseudoephedrine at Hyderabad, Telangana.
- On 31.07.2021, NCB, Chennai Zonal


- Unit seized 5 kg of Pseudoephedrine at Chennai, Tamilnadu.
- On 11.08.2021, NCB, Delhi Zonal Unit seized 7 kg of Pseudoephedrine at New Delhi. 01 person was arrested.

- On 07.10.2021, NCB, Madurai Sub-Zone seized 6.110 kg of Pseudoephedrine at Thanjavur, Tamilnadu. 01 person was arrested.

CASE STUDY-BIGGEST EPHEDRINE SEIZURE

1. Seizure of 45 Kg of Ephedrine by NCB Chennai Zone (upon followup action by Hyderabad Sub-Zone)

On 28.11.2020, NCB, Hyderabad had affected a seizure of 4.4 kg of Ephedrine from a courier parcel destained to Australia at DHL Hyderabad. Investigations revealed that one person based in Chennai had booked the parcel at Hyderabad. The Hyderabad team was searching this person persistently and finally he was traced and located at Chennai, His house search resulted in further recovery of 45 kg of Ephedrine and the seizure was affected by NCB, Chennai on 15/16.01.2021. Subsequently, one of the associates of the person from whose residence the contraband was seized, was also traced and arrested.









2. Seizure of 45 Kg of Pseudoephedrine by NCB Cochin Sub-Zone (Chennai Zone)

On 22.09.2021, two courier parcels destined to Australia were detected at KKM Complex, Kizhavana Road, Panampillynagar, Kochi, Ernakulam, Kerala. The consignment was originally booked at Kollam, Kerala. The courier parcels comprised of two cardboard carton boxes. The first cardboard carton box contained 19 Nos. of double layered Steel Milk Cookers. On cutting open the Milk cookers, it was found to contain white color transparent zip plastic pouches, further containing Pseudoephedrine concealed between the

two layers of the cookers. 57 numbers of pouches containing Pseudoephedrine were recovered.

Similarly, in the second cardboard carton box, 18 numbers of double layered steel bowls were found. On cut opening the bowls, each of the bowls found to contain 2 numbers of white color transparent zip plastic pouches containing Pseudoephedrine between the two layers. A total of 36 numbers of pouches containing Pseudoephedrine were recovered.

Thus a total of 11.660 Kgs of Pseudoephedrine was recovered and seized by the NCB team.



Significant seizures of Acetic Anhydride:

 On 13.02.2021, NCB, Kolkata Zonal Unit seized 65.300 kg of Acetic Anhydride at Murshidabad, West Bengal. 02 persons were arrested.

1.6 PHARMACEUTICAL DRUGS

India has one of the biggest pharmaceutical industrial bases & diversion pharmaceutical substances is resulting in the increasing abuse of prescription drugs. The problem seems to be serious in the North-East and North-West region of the country. The pharmaceutical products that are abused include Buprenorphine, Codeine-based cough syrups, Alprazolam, Diazepam and other sedatives. The easy availability of such preparations is the major factor that encourages their misuse. There is also a perception that these pharmaceutical drugs are less harmful than hard drugs like Heroin, Cocaine, etc. However, this is a misconception, since these can be addictive and also have a debilitating effect health.Pharmaceutical preparations having narcotic / psychotropic substances are under the purview of the Drugs and Cosmetic Act, and the NDPS Act in India. Law enforcement agencies have also seized

Law enforcement agencies have also seized sizeable quantities of Alprazolam tablets, Zolpidem, Tramadol tablets, Stidonafil tablets, etc.

Significant seizures of Pharmaceutical Drugs (Tablets):

 On 04.01.2021, NCB, Jammu Zonal Unit seized 964 bottles of Codeine based cough syrup & 14,352 capsules of Spasmo Proxyvon at Jammu. 01 person was arrested.

- On 18.01.2021, NCB, Ajmer Sub-Zone seized 43,800 tablets of Tramadol at Anupgarh, Rajasthan. 01 person was arrested.
- On 05.02.2021, NCB, Mumbai Zonal Unit seized 20 kg of Codeine based cough syrup Hashish at Kurla, Mumbai. 03 persons were arrested.
- On 09.02.2021, NCB, Mumbai Zonal Unit seized 23.900 kg of Codeine based cough syrup at Mumbai. 02 persons were arrested.
- On 18.02.2021, NCB, Delhi Zonal Unit seized 17,950 bottles of Codeine based cough syrup at Hapur, Uttar Pradesh.
- On 21.02.2021, NCB, Mumbai Zonal Unit seized 2.613 kg of Tramadol at Kurla, Mumbai.
- On 23.02.2021, NCB, Mumbai Zonal Unit seized 1.594 kg of Tramadol, 270 gram of Alprazolam and 6.900 kg of Codeine based cough syrup at Burari, New Delhi. 01 person was arrested.
- On 13.03.2021, NCB, Delhi Zonal Unit seized 1.200 kg of Alprazolam tablets and 1 kg of Oxycodone tablets at DHL Express Pvt. Ltd, Kirti Nagar, New Delhi.
- On 30.03.2021, NCB, Guwahati Zonal Unit seized 9,975 bottles of Codeine based cough syrup at Kamrup, Assam. 02 persons were arrested.
- On 05.04.2021, NCB, Delhi Zonal Unit seized 80.672 kg of Tramadol tablets at Agra, Uttar Pradesh. In follow up action 94,500 tablets of Zolpidem, 1,77,000 tablets of Nitrazepam, 66,000 tablets of Lorazepam, 6,72,600 tablets of Diazepam, 1,27,400 tablets of Clonazepam & 6,27,200 tablets of Alprazolam, 2,75,800 tablets & 31.12 liters of Tramadol, 5.800 kg of Tramadol & 62,637 bottles of Codeine based

cough syrup were seized. 01 person was arrested.

- On 05.04.2021, NCB, Lucknow Zonal Unit seized 1,15,272 bottles of Codeine Based Cough Syrup at Varanasi, Uttar Pradesh.
- On 07.04.2021, NCB, Delhi Zonal Unit seized 12,250 tablets of Tramadol, 2,000 tablets of Zolpidem, 7,910 tablets of Diazepam, 2,000 tablets of Clonazepam, 6,000 tablets & 1.286 kg of Alprazolam in follow up action, 03 persons were arrested.
- On 21.05.2021, NCB, Amritsar Sub-Zone seized 27,500 tablets of Tramadol at DTDC Express Ltd., Amritsar, Punjab.
- On 28.05.2021, NCB, Delhi Zonal Unit seized 13,40,100 tablets of Tramadol & 1,07,424 capsules of Tramadol at Ghaziabad, Uttar Pradesh. 01 person was arrested.
- On 02.06.2021, NCB, Delhi Zonal Unit seized 15,42,200 tablets of Tramadol, 4,080 capsules of Tramadol & 2,370 bottles of Codeine based cough syrup at Greater Noida, Uttar Pradesh. 01 person was arrested.
- On 10.06.2021, NCB, Delhi Zonal Unit seized 63,360 capsules of Tramadol, 16,000 injections of Buprenorphine & Rs. 1,22,000 at Raj Nagar, Ghaziabad, Uttar Pradesh. 02 persons were arrested.
- On 03.07.2021, NCB, Guwahati Zonal Unit seized 17.780 kg of Tramadol tablets & 900 tablets of Nitrazepam at Shree Maruti Courier Services Pvt. Ltd., Guwahati, Assam.
- On 14.08.2021, NCB, Hyderabad Sub-Zone seized 3.250 kg of Alprazolam & Rs. 12,75,000 /- at Hyderabad. 05

- persons were arrested.
- On 05.09.2021, NCB, Guwahati Zonal Unit seized 40,102 bottles of Codeine based cough syrup at Kamrup, Assam. 02 persons were arrested.
- On 25.11.2021, NCB, Patna Zonal Unit seized 12,296 bottles of Codeine based cough syrup at Patna, Bihar.

CASE STUDY - BIGGEST PHARMACEUTICAL SEIZURE

1. Series of seizures of huge quantities of Psychotropic Tablets, Amphetamine and Codeine Based Cough Syrup (CBCS) Bottles by NCB, Delhi Zonal Unit from 13.03.2021 to 08.04.2021

NCB, Delhi Zonal Unit effected a series of recoveries of huge quantity of Psychotropic tablets such as Alprazolam, Diazepam, Clonazepam, Lorazepam, Tramadol, Oxycodone, CBCS bottles etc. from various locations in Delhi & Agra (U.P.). Further, investigations revealed that these tablets were originated in India and destined for U.S.A., where these medicines are high in demand amongst the users. The details are as under:-

- On 13.03.2021, one parcel was seized wherein; 1.2 Kg of Alprazolam tablets & 01 Kg of loose Tramadol tablet were recovered from unclaimed parcel lying at DHL Express (India) Pvt. Ltd., Kirti Nagar, New Delhi.
- The consignment was being shipped in disguise of herbal health supplements. The details of the sender and receiver are as under:-

On 18.03.2021, based upon backward investigation in the matter, another 11 parcels which were yet to be booked, containing a total 111.585 Kg of loose Tramadol tablets, 30.21 Kg Zolpidem tablets were seized by NCB, Delhi Zonal Unit at Rightway Logistic Ltd., Mahipalpur, New Delhi. These parcels containing various psychotropic substances were also destined for USA.

- NCB, Delhi Zonal Unit conducted an enquiry about the consignor as per details obtained from the DHL Authorities, which were found fake.
- Further, investigations based on digital foot printing were carried out and the person who had shipped these parcels, was arrested by NCB, Delhi Zonal Unit on 31.03.2021 from Agra, U.P. During the Interrogation he revealed that seized medicines were received from another person R/o Agra.
- Upon the disclosure made by the first accused, another accused was intercepted at Agra and based on his discloser, 80.672 Kg of Tramadol loose Tablets were seized on 05.04.2021 at Agra U.P.
- Based on recovery and his statement the second accused was arrested on 05.04.2021. During the Interrogation he revealed that he purchased all seized medicine from JPEE Drugs Haridwar, Utarakhand and J.P Medicals Agencies Agra U.P.

- Further, based upon the discloser of second accused, NCB Delhi Zonal Unit has seized 20,40,500 various Psychotropic tablets, 62,637 Codeine Based Cough Syrup and 31.12 ltr of Tramadol Injection from a ware house of J.P. Medicals at Agra U.P.
- Subsequently, based upon the discloser of second accused NCB Delhi Zonal Unit has Seized 4.2 Kg of loose Tramadol tablets, 1.6 Kg of Tramadol tablets powder and 2,47,500 Tramadol Tablets on 07.04.2021 from manufacturing Unit of JPEE Drugs at sector 6A SIDCUL Haridwar U.K.
- further, investigations and technical analysis revealed that an organized drug syndicate of India and USA is behind the online drug market (Internet Pharmacy), which does their business through dark net portals. Quick actions were taken by NCB Delhi Zonal Unit and 04 more person were arrested in this case who had links with the prime accused, who used to send psychotropic medicines from India to USA.

The accused persons used to chat over Skype to their clients or sometimes directly to the customers by using fake IDs to place their orders and channelize the payments.

Apart from using Skype, these persons were using the Text now app to acquire US based telephone numbers in order to facilitate their business.

2. Seizure of 40,102 bottles of CBCS by NCB Guwahati Zone

On 05.09.2021 NCB Guwahati Zonal unit had seized a truck along with 40,102 bottles of Eskuf Cough Syrup (Codeine Based Cough Syrup) recovered from the truck which were hidden within the packets of rice. The contraband was loaded in Cooch Behar, West Bengal and

was destined to Tripura. Trafficker who was owner of the seized truck and cotrafficker were arrested on 06.09.2021. The associate who directed the trafficker (owner of Truck) to load Eskuf cough syrup at Coochbehar was also arrested during follow up.



1.7 NEW PSYCHOACTIVE SUBSTANCES (NPS)

UNODC defines NPS as "substances of a buse, both pure form or preparation, not controlled by the 1961 Single Convention on Narcotic Drugs or the 1971 Convention on Psychotropic Substances, but which may pose a public health threat".

The term "new" does not necessarily refer to new inventions — several NPS were first synthesized decades ago — but to substances that have recently become available on the market.

NPS have been known in the market by terms such as "legal highs", "bath salts" and "research chemicals".

Challenges:

The rapid emergence and presence of large number of NPS on the global drug market.

Poses a significant risk to public health and a challenge to drug policy.

Pose a considerable challenge for prevention and treatment due to less knowledge about the adverse health effects and social harms of NPS.

Difficult to carry out analysis and identification of large number of chemically diverse substances present in drug markets.

Monitoring, information sharing, early warning and risk awareness are essential to respond to this situation.

Risks:

Side effects of NPS range from seizures to agitation, aggression, acute psychosis as well as potential development of dependence.

Safety data on toxicity and carcinogenic potential, long-term adverse effects or risks, purity and composition of products of many NPS are not known.

This places users at high risk as evidenced by hospital emergency admissions and deaths associated with NPS, often including cases of polysubstance use.

1.8 USE OF DARK NET IN DRUG TRAFFICKING

Seizures of Narcotics drugs and psychotropic substances trafficked using Dark Net

- In the months of March to April, 2021, Officers of NCB, Delhi Zonal Unit seized huge quantity of Tramadol and other psychotropic substances alongwith 62673 bottles of CBCS and arrested 06 persons.
- On 02.06.2021, Officers of NCB, Delhi Zonal Unit seized 15 lakh tablets of Tramadol and 8000 bottles of Codeine and arrested 01 person.
- In the month of June, 2021, Officers of NCB, Kolkata Zonal Unit seized more than 20 kg of Ganja.
- In the month of August to Oct., 2021, Officers of NCB, Delhi Zonal Unit

- seized 286 LSD blots, 5.726 Kg Curated Marijuana bud, 260.45 Gram MDMA, 6 Gram Heroin, 145.6 Gram Charas and psychotropic tablets.
- In the month of September 2021,Officers of NCB, Delhi Zonal Unit seized 34 LSD blots, 66 Gram Marijuana, 44.95 Gram Ecstacy and 21 Gram Charas in two different cases and arrested 09 persons.
- In the month of October 2021, Officers of NCB, Delhi Zonal Unit seized 9 LSD blots, 1.89 Gram Marijuana and 34.17 Gram Charas and arrested 01 person.

1.9 CONTROLLED DELIVERY

Controlled Delivery is a technique which allows illicit or suspected consignments of Narcotics Drugs and Psychotropic substances, controlled substances or substances substituted for them to pass out of, or through or into territory of India with the knowledge and under the supervision of an officer empowered in this behalf or duly authorized under section 50A with a view to identify the persons involved in the commission of an offence under this act.

The Director General of Narcotics Control Bureau constituted under sub section (3) of section 4 or any other officer authorized by him in this behalf, any notwithstanding anything contained in this Act, undertake controlled delivery of any consignment to:-

Any destination in India;

a foreign country, in consultation with the competent authority of such foreign country to which such consignment is destined, in such a manner as may be prescribed.

During the year 2021, total 08 controlled delivery operations were carried out by NCB and other agencies as well.

1.10 DISPOSAL OF DRUGS

Narcotics Control Bureau disposed off various narcotic drugs or psychotropic substances during the calendar year 2021 owing their vulnerability to theft, substitution, constraints of proper storage space.



TRAINING

2.1 TRAINING

The mandate of NCB also creates an obligation on it for capacity building of other drug law enforcement agencies entrusted to enforce the drug laws in the country. In addition to provide materialistic support to them through the assistance to states scheme, it is also mandatory to develop and enhance enforcement skills in their personnel /drug law enforcement officers.

Training programmes are conducted by Policy & Co-ordination wing of Narcotics Control Bureau, through a variety of channels. In India, the officers working for drug law enforcement include officers from Central and State Government agencies which include the following;

- Narcotics Control Bureau
- Customs and Central Excise
- Department of Revenue Intelligence
- Border Guarding Forces
- State Police
- State Excise
- State Drug Controller, etc.

Common training requirements of the above mentioned agencies include, principal laws like Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances Act, 1985, PITNDPS Act, 1988, Regulation of Controlled Substances Order (RCS Order), 2013, Circular/ notifications, documentation procedures, emergence of New Psychoactive Substances (NPS), precursor control mechanism, collection of intelligence, National/ International trends in drug traicking, the study of reasons for

acquittal of cases.

NCB conducts regular short duration training programmes for such field officials, either by itself or in co-ordination with other authorities like National Academy for Custom, Excise and Narcotics(NACEN), Intelligence Bureau(IB), Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI), North Eastern Police Academy(NEPA), National Institute of Criminology and Forensic Sciences (NICFS), Central Academy of Police Training (CAPT), National Forensic Science University (NFSU), Border Guarding Forces, State Police Training Centres, etc.

These programmes also provide a platform for sharing of best practices of the agencies in their respective areas of strength like increased knowledge of Drug Law Enforcement, enhancement of intelligence collection as well as investigation, knowing new trends & patterns of drug trafficking, understanding the execution of "Controlled Delivery" operations, busting of Clandestine Labs etc.

NCB also provides 'resource persons' and training materials to other sister organizations like NACEN, CBI Academy, NICFS, BSF, SSB,NPA and State Police Academies for specialized training in drug law enforcement.

In the year 2021, most of the trainings were imparted through virtual platforms as a norm due to the restrictions imposed arising out of the COVID-19 pandemic.

2.2 ASSISTANCE TO STATES

With a view to eradicate the drug menace, the Government of India has introduced a Scheme namely 'Assistance to States/UTs for Narcotics Control' to finance State Governments to strengthen their enforcement capabilities for combating illicit trafficking in Narcotics Drugs and Psychotropic Substances. Under this Scheme, financial assistance is given for augmenting the drug law enforcement capabilities of the States.

The Scheme was launched by the Ministry of Home Affairs on 24th October, 2004 for 05 years which was extended from time to time under existing guidelines. The details of the time line of the scheme is as under:

Implementation of EAT (Expenditure Advance and Transfer) Module of PFMS

MHA had communicated to NCB that the Department of Expenditure, Ministry of Finance had emphasized that the release of funds to State Governments and monitoring further utilization should be undertaken through EAT (Expenditure Advance Transfer) module of PFMS. The monitoring can be implemented only if the Implementing Agencies are registered and mapped on PFMS and use EAT module of PFMS.

Accordingly, NCB requested all States receiving financial assistance under the scheme "Assistance to States/UTs for Narcotics Control" to register their respective agencies on PFMS, who are utilizing the fund provided under the ibid scheme. It was requested that the registration details be sent to NCB for further mapping.

The States are in the process of registering their agencies on PFMS the details received by NCB till now have been mapped on the EAT Module of PFMS.

2.3 DRUG DETECTION KITS

NCB procures and provides Drug Detection


Kits to the Drug Law Enforcement Agencies across the country. These DD Kits provides simple, correct and user friendly method for 'on the spot' testing of suspected materials even by non-technical officials. These Drug Detection Kits are of three types:


- A) Narcotic Drugs Detection Kit,
- B) Precursor Chemicals Detection Kit and
- C) Ketamine Detection Kit.

The DD Kits are procured centrally by NCB Hqrs. since 1989 from Hindustan Antibiotics Ltd., Pune and distributed to the Zonal Units of NCB. The DD Kits received by the Zonal Units are further distributed to all the drug law enforcement agencies falling under their jurisdiction.

Narcotics Control Bureau procures Drug Detection Kits for all Drug Law enforcement agencies of the country. The same was distributed by NCB Zones to State Police and other Drug Law Enforcement Agencies as follows:

- a) Standard size Narcotics DrugDetection Kits 2200
- b) Precursors Chemical Detection kits 600
- c) Ketamine Detection Kits 300

2.4 DRUG DEMAND REDUCTION

Demand Reduction refers to the steps taken by any agency to reduce demand for consumption of narcotic drugs or psychotropic substances. The demand reduction strategy is in addition to the supply reduction strategy which focuses on drug interdiction.

The Government of India has mandated the Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment (MSJ&E) to run different demand reduction programmes.

The measures adopted for demand reduction include:

- Awareness building and educating people about harmful consequences of narcotic drugs
 - Community-based intervention for

identification, treatment, motivation, counselling and rehabilitation of drug addicts

• Training of volunteers/service providers and other stake holders.

Initiatives to take e-pledge against Drugs

Narcotics Control Bureau (NCB) apart from being the premier drug law enforcement agency, is also entrusted with the responsibility of spreading awareness against the ill effects of drugs in coordination with State authorities and other stakeholders. With a view to achieve this goal, an e-pledge titled "Say yes to Life, No to Drugs" was up-loaded on the website mygov.in.



The objective of this pledge is to spread the message of ill effect of drugs among the citizens so that they may show their resolve in making India a drugs free nation and leading a healthy life. The link to the e-pledge is as given below:-

Various Central Ministries such as Ministry of

Social Justice & Empowerment, Ministry of Health & Family Welfare, Ministry of Education, Ministry of Law and Justice, Department of Personnel & Training, National Commission for Protection of Child Rights, CAPFs and State authorities including Police & other sister agencies were made aware about this e-pledge with a request to further disseminate this information across the

society, including educational institutions, so that a mass movement () can be generated in fight against drugs.

NCB has also started the 'fully pledged campus' movement through its Zonal units in selected schools and colleges/educational institutions in a mission/campaign mode under the overall guidance of concerned Regional Offices. During the 3rd meeting of APEX Committee of NCORD dated 27.12.2021, which was presided over by the Hon'ble Union Home Minister, the Hon'ble Union Home Minister, the Hon'ble Union Home Minister had also appreciated the initiative. At the end of 2021, more than 9.00 lakh people had taken this e-pledge against drugs.

- Transmission of Anti-Drug Message through Radio channel
- SMS alert about drug awareness
- Observance of 26 June as 'International Day Against Drug Abuse & Illicit Traicking' to create awareness

During 2021, NCB carried out 252 awareness and educational programmes as part of drug demand reduction activities across the country, covering approximately 26,311 participants.

"International Day Against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking"

Due to the restrictions resulting from the COVID pandemic, this year NCB had launched an awareness campaign, through various social media platforms. NCB, through its various Zonal Units had launched a massive online campaign against the ill effects of Drugs on the occasion of 26th June, 2021, i.e., "International Day Against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking" majorly through various activities such as circulation of Audio Video messages by eminent personalities from the field of Politics, Bureaucracy, Sports, Films, Music etc. Anti drugs messages from the twitter handles of Hon'ble Prime Minister of India and Hon'ble Union Home Minister and other eminent personalities boosted this online campaign in huge way.

The Zonal Units of NCB had also put up a huge effort in this regard and messages from eminent personalities having national and regional following were broadcasted through Facebook, twitter etc. to motivate the youth of our country and to wean them away from the ill effects of drugs. Such AV messages were again circulated through youtube, twitter etc from the official channel/ handles of NCB.

Telcome service providers, FM radios, Television Channels were also used by NCB and its Field Units and its Officers for spreading anti drugs messages in general public.


DG NCB had also requested the Chief





3.1.3 JUDICIAL COOPERATION

a) Controlled Delivery Operations:

- NCB conducts Controlled delivery operations in coordination with other countries. The Director General, Narcotics Control Bureau is empowered under Section 50A of the NDPS Act, 1985 to authorize "controlled delivery" of any contraband drugs to India or abroad.
- During the year 2021, total 08 controlled delivery operations were carried out by NCB and other agencies as well.

b) Mutual Legal Assistance:

- Mutual Legal Assistance Treaty (MLAT) is an agreement between two countries for gathering and transfer of evidence. Mutual Legal Assistance Treaty usually provides the framework to facilitate the widest measure of mutual assistance in:
- taking evidence or statements from persons;
- effecting service of judicial documents;
- executing searches and seizures;
- examining objects and sites;
- providing information and evidentiary items;
- providing originals or certified copies of the relevant documents and records including bank, financial, corporate, and business records;
- identifying or tracing proceeds, property, instrumentalities
- or other things for evidentiary purposes;
- The specific form of Mutual Legal Assistance that can be given or obtained depends on the provisions of the treaty with the foreign government.
- India has signed Mutual Legal Assistance Treaties with 40 countries namely Australia, Azerbaijan, Bahrain, Bangladesh, Belarus, Bosnia & Herzegovina, Bulgaria, Canada, Egypt, France, Hongkong, Indonesia, Iran, Israel, Kazakhstan, Kuwait, Kyrgez Republic, Maldives, Malaysia, Mangolia, Mauritius, Mexico, Myanmar, Russia, Singapore, South Africa, South Korea, Spain, Sri Lanka, Sultanate of Oman, Switzerland, Tajikistan, Thailand, Turkey, Ukraine, UAE, UK, USA, Uzbekistan and Vietnam.

c) Extradition:

- Extradition is the process of surrendering a fugitive residing in a country, who is wanted by the law enforcement of another country, after due process.
- India has extradition treaties with 48 countries.
- India has extradition arrangements on the basis of reciprocity with 12 countries.
- The Indian Extradition Act contains a provision in terms of which extradition can be considered even in the absence of an extradition treaty if the ofence for which extradition has been sought is included in any international convention to which both India and the other country seeking extradition are parties.

3.1.4 INCB/UNODC Reporting

• Being a signatory to the various international conventions on narcotic drugs and psychotropic substances, India is under obligation to submit the required information to the United Nations oice of Drugs Crime (UNODC) and International Narcotics Control Board (INCB) in the prescribed formats. NCB is the nodal/central agency for implementation of the India's obligations under various international conventions.

International Narcotics Control Board (INCB)

To meet the international obligations under the UN Conventions on Narcotic Drugs, 1961, Convention on Psychotropic Substances, 1971 and United Nations Convention against illicit traffic in Narcotics Drugs and Psychotropic Substances, 1988, NCB submits seven reports in the prescribed formats namely, Form A, B, C, D, P, A/P and B/P to INCB Vienna. Form A & A/P relating to Import and Export of Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances, respectively, are being submitted to INCB on a quarterly basis.

• The other Forms i.e B, C, D & P are being submitted to INCB on an annual basis. These forms are related to annual assessment/ estimates of narcotics drugs and psychotropic substances in different fields. While Form B/P is being submitted once in three years, which is related to annual assessment of medical and scientific requirement of scheduled substances. Inputs on the different Forms come from agencies like Central Bureau of Narcotics (CBN), the Chief Controller of Factories (CCF), the Drug Controller General of India (DCGI) besides the Narcotics Control Bureau (NCB).

United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC)

Each member country has to provide inputs in the Annual Report Questionnaire (ARQ) every year on the working of the international drug control treaties to UNODC. Before 2021, ARQ has to be submitted offline and contained 04 Parts:

Part I: Legislative and Institutional Framework

Part II: Comprehensive Approach to Drug
Demand Reduction and Supply

Part III: Extent and Patterns of Drug Use

Part IV: Extent and Patterns of and Trends in Drug Crop Cultivation and Drug Manufacture and Trafficking

However, from 2021, the Annual Report Questionnaire (ARQ) is to be filled online by the Officially Appointed Focal Point. The ARQ for 2020 is divided into 14 Annual Modules (A01-A14) and 06 Rotating Modules (R06, R07, R09, R11, R12, R13).

3RD APEX level NCORD Meeting

3rd meeting of the Apex level Committee of NCORD was held on 27.12.2021 at Vigyan Bhawan in a Hybrid mode (both online and offline), which was presided over by the Hon'ble Union Home Minister Sh. Amit Shah. Officers from various Central Ministries / Departments / Agencies as well as Chief Secretaries and DGP of States/UTs

participated in this meeting. For the first time new participants Ministries and Departments like Department of pharmaceuticals, Department of school education & literacy, Ministry of ports shipping and waterways, NCRB, NIA, Coast Guard and Department of posts etc. have been invited in light of emerging threat of drugs to society and to have a Co-ordinated approach.



Hon'ble Home Minister has given directions to adopt a time bound zero tolerance approach to combat the threat of drug trafficking/abuse so as to safeguard future generations. He emphasized that action shoud be initiated against not only the small time consumer but also the mid to high level traffickers and syndicates involved in the trafficking and it should be made a part of the overall strategy

of investigation and prosecution in all cases related to drug trafficking. Further to this, Various directions were given by Hon'ble Home Minister for strengthening the existing NCORD mechanism and exhorted all the participants to make a conscious & collective effort to fulfill the vision of "Nasha Mukt Bharat" and to make Narcotics Control a thrust area of operation. Some of the major

decisions taken during the meeting are as under:

- Meetings at all levels of NCORD should be conducted regularly and at Central level, an NCORD Secretariat at NCB should be created.
- A dedicated Anti-Narcotics Task Force (ANTF) headed by ADG/IG level Police Officer needs to be established in each State which may also function as the NCORD Secretariat for the State.
- The mandate of Joint Coordination Committee (JCC) to be expanded.
- Separate training modules on Drugs related offences and procedures may be designed.
- Inter-Ministerial Committee on "dual use" prescription drugs and precursors.
- Indian Coast Guard, Indian Navy & Ports Authorities may be included as permanent members of State NCORD Committees to look into the issue of trans-national drug

trafficking through the maritime route.

- Electronic Container Scanning devices need to be installed at all entry points (Ports) into the country and Best Practices evolved by other countries may be adopted.
- Creation of National Canine Pool as a National Asset,
- Establishment of a dedicated, 24 x 7, toll free National Narcotics Helpline as a suitable mean of interface with the public for sharing of inputs and information on drug cases.
- An effective task force may be set up on Darknet and Crypto-Currency.
- Use of new technologies and innovations on ground for mapping illicit cultivation.
- Anti-drug awareness campaigns such as "Nasha Mukt Bharat Abhiyaan" to be expanded in scope through involvement of various stakeholders for mass awareness generation.

ORGANISATION

4.1 NCB CHARTER

- In exercise of powers under Section 4 of NDPS Act, 1985, the 'NARCOTICS CONTROL BUREAU' was constituted with Headquarters at Delhi with effect from 17th Mar, 1986. The Bureau, subject to the supervision and control of the Central Government, is to exercise powers and functions of the Central Government for taking measures with respect to:
- Co-ordination of actions by various offices, State Governments and other

- authorities under the N.D.P.S. Act, Customs Act, Drugs and Cosmetics Act and any other law for the time being in force in connection with the enforcement provisions of the NDPS Act, 1985.
- Implementation of the obligation in respect of counter measures against illicit traffic under the various international conventions and protocols that are in force at present or which may be ratified or acceded to by India in future.ingh, Zonal Director, NCB Kolkata.



- Assistance to concerned authorities in foreign countries and concerned international organizations to facilitate coordination and universal action for prevention and suppression of illicit traic in these drugs and substances.
- Coordination of actions taken by other concerned Ministries, Departments and Organizations in respect of matters relating to drug abuse.
- On the recommendation of the Group of Ministers (GoM) on national security, NCB was transferred from Department of Revenue (DoR) to Ministry of Home Affairs (MHA) on 18.02.2003.

4.2 NCB ORGANISATION

 The NCB was established in 1986, with a sanctioned strength of 164 and Zonal Units at Delhi, Kolkata, Chennai, Mumbai and Varanasi. Later new zones

- were sanctioned at Jodhpur, Chandigarh, Jammu, Ahmadabad, Indore, Guwahati, Patna and Bangalore whereas the Varanasi zone was shifted to Lucknow. Besides the office of three Deputy Director Generals (Regional) were created, one each in Delhi, Kolkata and Mumbai. 4.5 हिंदी लेख

1. मादक पदार्थों के दुष्प्रभाव निवारण में योग की भूमिका:

आधुनिक युग में समाज में व्याप्त कुरीतियों में प्रथम दृष्ट्या हमारी युवा पीढ़ी एवं नागरिकों द्वारा बड़ी मात्रा में मादक पदार्थों का सेवन अत्यधिक प्रचलित है। मादक पदार्थों से उत्पन्न स्थिति मादकता कहलाती है जब व्यक्ति शरीर संचालन के लिये नियमित मादक पदार्थों का उपयोग करता है तब वह व्यसन कहलाता है। यह एक गंभीर समस्या है इस समस्या का समाधान योग से संभव हो सकता है।

किसी भी प्रकार का व्यसन व्यक्ति की कार्यक्षमता को कम करता है साथ ही समाज और परिवार दोनों ही दृष्टि से हानिकारक है। मादक पदार्थों के सेवन से कई शारीरिक दुष्प्रभाव होते हैं जैसेः दिल के रोग, श्वसन का संक्रमण, स्नायुतंत्र अवसाद, खांसी, गुर्दे व यकृत का खराब होना, नींद नहीं आना, स्वः उत्तेजना, कमजोरी, आंत व उदर के रोग इत्यादि अन्य शारीरिक दुष्प्रभाव शामिल हैं। यह आर्थिक उन्नति में बाधक बनता है तथा इससे कानून व्यवस्था पर प्रतिकूल प्रभाव पड़ता है।

लगातार मादक पदार्थों के सेवन से तंत्रिका तंत्र (Nervous System) से शरीर के विभिन्न अंगों का सामंजस्य प्रभावित होता है व व्यक्ति मानसिक स्तर पर कमजोर हो जाता है इस परिस्थिति में योग के माध्यम से शारीरिक व मानसिक स्तर पर अत्यंत लाभकारी परिणाम प्राप्त हो सकते हैं। "योग" एक शारीरिक व आध्यात्मिक प्रक्रिया है। जिसमें शरीर, मन, आत्मा को एक साथ लाने का कार्य होता है।

श्रीमद भागवत गीता के अनुसार "योगस्य कर्मशु कौशलम" अर्थात :— कर्मों में कुशलता ही योग है। जब व्यक्ति के कर्म में कुशलता होगी तो उसके जीवन में स्वतः ही मादक पदार्थों का कोई स्थान न होगा।

महर्षि पतंजिल योगसूत्र के अनुसार योगस्य चित्तवृतिः निरोध अर्थातः — चित्त में उत्पन्न होने वाली वृतियों को रोकना ही योग है। योग के माध्यम से व्यक्तियों के मन में नशे व मादक पदार्थों के सेवन के विचारों को रोका जा सकता है।

' अष्टांग योग :- यम, नियम, आसन, प्राणायाम, प्रत्याहार, धारणा, ध्यान, समाधि

यह अभ्यास मानसिक, शारीरिक, आध्यात्मिक, सामाजिक स्वास्थ्य के क्षेत्र में विकास के ''आठ स्तरों'' पर कार्य करता है। आसन, प्राणायाम की अन्य विधायें ध्यान केंदित करने की शक्ति को बढ़ाती है। शरीर को मानसिक अवसाद शांत करने में मदद मिलती है। सूर्य नमस्कार, भस्त्रिका, अनुलोम—विलोम, उज्जाई, कड़ी शोधन, भ्रामरी, मंत्र योग, लय योग, किया योग आदि योग विधायें

शारीरिक, मानसिक चेतना को विकसित करने में अत्यंत उपयोगी हैं व आध्यात्मिक उन्नति प्रदान करने वाली हैं।

माननीय प्रधानमंत्री श्री नरेन्द्र मोदी जी के अथक प्रयासों से वर्ष 2015 से 21 जून को पूरे विश्व में योग दिवस मनाया जाता है। सम्पूर्ण विश्व में योग के प्रति जागरूकता बढ़ी है। नशा मुक्ति केंद्रों में योग के महत्व को समझते हुए इसे अनिवार्य किया गया है। कोविड—19 महामारी में भी योग की प्रासंगिकता को सिद्ध किया है। धन्यवाद

2 नशे के साथ, जीवन का सफरनामा

कुछ लोग कहते हैं बिना नशे के
जिंदगी में मजा क्या है
लेकिन समझने की कोशिश तो करो
वास्तव में, यह नशा क्या है
इस नशे का वास्तविक पता क्या है
वास्तव में आखिर आपको, नशा क्या है

रात के करीब 11 बजे थे, मैं अकेला रेलवे स्टेशन की तरफ पैदल चला जा रहा था, रात के करीब 11 बजकर 30 मिनट पर मेरी ट्रेन थी, मैं स्टेशन के लगभग करीब पहुँच चुका था तभी रेलवे की पटरी के किनारे झुग्गी बस्तियों से किसी के रोने की आवाज आ रही थी। मैं जैसे-जैसे रेलवे स्टेशन के करीब बढ़ता जा रहा था वह रोने की आवाज मुझे और स्पष्ट सुनाई दे रही थी। मैं थोड़ा और करीब पहुचाँ तो वह रोने की शोर एक कोलाहल में तब्दील होने लगी थी। मैं थोड़ा असमंजस में था युवा उम्र होने के कारण मेरे मन में इस बात का कौतुहल भी था कि मैं उस घटना के बारे में जानकारी ले सकूँ और दूसरी तरफ मेरी ट्रेन के छूट जाने का भय भी था फिर भी मैं उस चीख और रोने की आवाज से खुद को दूर नहीं ले जा सका और जब करीब पहुचाँ तो देखा की कुछ औरतों को कुछ पूरूषों के द्वारा बहुत ही निर्दयता पूर्वक ड़डों से बुरी तरह पीटा जा रहा था, सभी पुरुष किसी नशें में धूत लग रहे थे जो खुद भी पागलों की तरह चींख रहे थे, कभी इधर तो कभी उधर स्वतः भी गिर रहे थे । दूसरी तरफ औरतें खुद को अपने और अपने बच्चों को बचाने के लिए चींख-चींख कर रो रही थी लेकिन शरदऋतु की ठढ़ में वहाँ ऐसा सन्नाटा था की उनकी मदद करने के लिए कोई आने वाला नहीं दिख रहा था।

मैं उस घटना को देखने के बाद वहाँ खुद को बहुत अधिक समय तक रोक नहीं पाया और दौड़ते हुए वहाँ से रेलवे प्लेटफार्म की तरफ जाने लगा, मेरे मन में इस बात का बहुत ही म्लान हो रहा था कि मैं अकेला होने की वजह से उनकी कोई मदद नहीं कर पा रहा था क्योंकि वो खानाबदोस जिंदगी जीने वाले लोग थे, उनके बीच में बोलना मुझे उचित नहीं प्रतीत हो रहा था। मैं जैसे ही रेलवे स्टेशन पहुँचा मैनें वहाँ पर रेलवे पुलिस बल के कार्मिकों का एक पोस्ट देखा जिसके उपर लिखा था "मैं आपकी क्या सहायता कर सकता हूँ?" अचानक मेरे मन में एक बात आयी, क्यों ना इन लोगों से उस घटना का जिक्र किया जाए, शायद यह लोग उन मजलूम औरतों और बच्चों की कुछ सहायता कर सकें।

मैं हिम्मत जुटाने के बाद उनके पास गया और उनसे उस पूरी घटना के बारे में बताया जो कुछ मैनें देखा और सूना था उसके बाद मैं अपनी ट्रेन में जाकर बैठ गया। मेरी ट्रेन की यात्रा सुबह 04 बजकर 40 मिनट पर खत्म हुई और मैं लगभग सुबह 06 बजे अपने घर पहूँच गया था, लेकिन उस रात की घटना जो कुछ मैनें देखा था उसकी यात्रा आज तक मेरे साथ चलती है, ना जाने कितने सवाल हैं जो आज भी कभी—कभी मुझें झकझोरते हैं।

आखिर कब तक अपने स्वार्थ की खातिर कुछ इंसान, दूसरे इंसानों को नशे का जहर देते रहेगें? हमारे समाज में नशे का जहर बोने वाले कौन हैं? इस नशे के कारोबार को खत्म करने की जिम्मेदारी किसकी है?

नशे को खत्म करने में आखिर मेरी क्या भूमिका है?

3- ड्रग्स और बच्चे

विश्व ने पिछले कुछ दशकों में, विशेष रूप से तकनीकी प्रगति के मामले में, भारी बदलाव देखा है। इस प्रगति की वजह से धीरे—धीरे हमारी जीवन शैली और समग्र सामाजिक संरचना में भी परिवर्तन हुआ है। एकल परिवारों का उदय, मित्रों और रिश्तेदारों से अलगाव, आत्मकेंद्रित जीवन आदि ऐसे परिवर्तनों के कुछ परिणाम हैं। सामाजिक संरचना में यह परिवर्तन अकेलेपन, अवसाद, उच्च रक्तचाप आदि व्याधिओं के रूप में लोगों को अपना शिकार बना रहा है और इसका सबसे अधिक प्रभाव हमारे बच्चों पर पड़ रहा

है। इसके अतिरिक्त, ब्टप्य महामारी ने बच्चों को पिछले दो वर्षों के अधिकांश भाग के लिए अपने घरों के अंदर ही सीमित रखा है, जिसका बच्चों के कोमल हृदय पर गहरा प्रभाव पड़ सकता है। उपरोक्त परिस्थितियों के संयोजन से बच्चों के बीच मनोसामाजिक समस्याओं के बढ़ने के अंदेशे को मना नहीं किया जा सकता ही जोकि ड्रग्स नामक एक घातक संकट का उनके जीवन में प्रवेश के लिए एक आदर्श स्थिति बनाती है।

5. LEGAL SECTION

Legal Section in NCB HQrs. functions under the Deputy Legal Adviser and the DDG (Legal & Training) to assist NCB HQrs as well as NCB Regions and Zones in all legal matters. The following are the some of the important functions carried out by the section:

- 1) PROCESSING OF SLP PROPOSALS:
 Legal section processes the SLP
 proposals of NCB Zones received
 against the orders of Hon'ble High
 Courts in Supreme Court of India. The
 Proposals are processed through
 Ministry of Law & Justice. The section
 ensures drafting, filing of SLPs in
 Supreme Court in coordination with
 Central Agency Section, Ministry of Law
 & Justice.
- 2) MONITORING OF SLPs IN SUPREME COURT: Legal Section monitors the SLP matters filed in Supreme Court and ensures briefing of Ld. ASsG and other panel counsels on each date of hearing. The orders received in NCB cases are forwarded to NCB zones for further action/information.
- 3) PURSUING OF WRIT PETITIONS IN HIGH COURTS: Legal section also monitors the writ petitions filed in various High Courts where NCB is a party. Timely filing of counter affidavit and briefing of Panel counsels are also ensure.
- 4) **VETTING OF LEGAL DOCUMENTS:**Legal Section also vets all legal documents including applications, petitions, complaints, replies/counter affidavit etc to be filed in various courts.

5) TENDERING OF LEGAL OPINION:

The Deputy Legal Adviser as a representative of Ministry of Law and Justice tenders opinion in all legal as well administrative matters of NCB HQrs/Regions/Zones/Sub Zones placed before him. Legal Section also provides opinion in the matter of appeal to High Court to NCB Zones of northern region where no branch secretariat of Ministry of Law & Justice does not function.

DRAFTING AND CIRCULATION OF NCB CIRCULARS/SOPs: The Legal section also tasked with drafting of important circulars and SOPs especially on Legal Matters.

7)

- APPOINTMENT OF SPPs IN NCB: Legal Section also look after the entire process of appointment of SPPs starting from the seeking vacancies, publication, and taking up with Ministry of Law & Justice.
- **MONITORING OF PERFORMANCE OF SPPs:** Legal Section also monitors the performance of SPPs and places before the competent authority for issuance of appropriate directions in the matter.
- 9) ANALYSIS OF ACQUITTAL CASES: Legal Section also analyses acquittal orders of trial courts and issues necessary instructions to zone for observation.
- 10) CIRCULATION OF LANDMARK
 JUDGMENTS: Legal Section also
 circulates important and landmark
 judgments of Hon'ble Supreme Court
 and High Courts to NCB Zones/Regions
 for their information and compliance.

11) FURNISHING OF COMMENTS ON REPATRIATION/TRANSFER OF ACCUSED PERSONS BETWEEN 13) INDIA AND OTHER COUNTRIES:

Legal Section also furnishes comments on the repatriation and transfer of accused persons between India and other countries.

12) IMPARTING OF TRAINING ON LEGAL TOPICS: Deputy Legal Adviser and other staff members in Legal Section are also

detailed for delivering lectures on legal topic during training programs/seminars etc.

EXAMINATION OF AMENDMENT PROPOSALS: Legal Section examines the amendment proposals received from various agencies and put up its comments on the proposed amendments.

3. WORKLOAD:

In Para 14, the Court has stated that each state particularly states of Uttar Pradesh, West Club and Jammu & Kashmir will have a Special Court and that the number of Special Courts will be in proportion to volume of cases. It is also stated that until establishment of NDPS Courts, NDPS cases will be prioritized over all other matters.

4. NARCOTIC LABS:

In Para 15, Apex Court has pointed out that each state is directed to establish state level and regional level forensic labs. The number of such labs will be dependent upon the backlog of cases in the state.

5. RE-TESTING PROVISIONS:

The Apex Court has highlighted the fact that NDPS Act does not permit resampling/re-testing of samples, thus the Court ordered that any requests as to re-testing/re-sampling shall not be entertained under the NDPS Act as a matter of course. These may, however, be permitted, in extremely exceptional circumstances, for cogent reasons to be recorded by the Presiding judge. An application in such rare cases must be made within a period of fifteen days from the receipt of the test report No applications for re-testing /re- sampling shall be entertained thereafter.

6. MONITORING:

The Apex Court has directed that nodal officers be appointed in all the departments dealing with the NDPS Cases for monitoring of the progress of investigation and trial. The is nodal officer must be

				equivalent to the rank of Superintendent of Police, who shall ensure that the trial is not delayed due to account of non supply of documents, non-availability of the witnesses, or for any other reason. The Apex Court has also stated that there must be one Pairvi Officer or any other officer for each Court who shall report that days proceeding to the nodal officer assigned for each Court. 7. PUBLIC PROSECUTORS: The Apex Court has stressed upon the quality of the SPPs and directed that, the District and Sessions Judge shall make recommendations for such appointments in consultation with the Administrative Judge/Portfolio Judge/Inspecting Judge, in-charge of looking after the administration of the concerned Sessions Division." 8. OTHER RECOMMENDATIONS: The Apex Court has observed that for simplification of the above detailed process, the filing of the charge-sheet and supply of the documents must also be provided in electronic form. However, the Court also directed that this must not be treated as a substitute for hard copies which are indispensable

With regards to the disposal of seized contraband

Cases where Trial is concluded and proceedings in appeal / revision have all concluded (if any before 29.5.1989):

The Court states that in cases that stood finally concluded at Trial, appeal, revision and further appeals, if any before 29.5.1989, the continued storage of NDPS, controlled substances and conveyances is of no consequence and has thus directed that all the Drugs Disposal Committees of the States and the Central agencies shall take stock of all such seized contrabands and take steps for their disposal without any further verification.

5.2 Amendments in section 27A of NDPS Act, Ordinance, promulgated on 30.09.2021, to 1985

Hon'ble High Court of Tripura observed an anomaly in section 27A of the Act caused due to not amending 'clause (viiia)' mentioned in Section 27A to 'clause (viiib)' consequent to amendment made in Section 2 of the Act vide 2. (viiib). Consequently, Narcotic Drugs and retrospective effect w.e.f. 01.05.2014. Psychotropic Substances (Amendment)

rectify this anomaly by making changes in Section 27A of NDPS Act in order to carry out the legislative intent of the statute, which has always been to read clause: (viiib) in section 27A, and already stood therein.

Vide gazette notification Extraordinary, Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances Part-II dated 30.12.2021, the government has (Amendment) Act 2014 wherein existing clause notified the amendment in section 27A. Copy (viiia) of Section 2 was re-lettered as clause enclosed. The amendment has been given


